

How much does college cost? How am I going to pay for it??

1. Use the **Net Price Calculator** for each college you are considering

- You can find these on the *Financial Aid* section of all colleges

2. Calculate your family's Expected Family Contribution (**EFC**)

- Use the FAFSA4caster - <http://www.isac.org/calculators/>

3. Determine whether you are eligible for a **Pell Grant**

- FAFSA4caster will tell you whether you're eligible
- Maximum Pell Grant is around \$6,000

4. You may also receive an **FSEOG Grant** if you are eligible for a Pell Grant,

- FSEOG Grants are from \$100 - \$4,000
- Awarded by participating colleges to those with very low EFCs

5. Estimate your Monetary Award Program (**MAP**) Grant

- Use the Monetary Award Program (MAP) Estimator www.isac.org/calculators/
- Note: you can only get a MAP Grant if you attend a college in Illinois
- Maximum MAP Grant is around \$5,000

6. Determine the **Cost of Attendance** at all colleges you are considering

Ideas to Make College Affordable:

Scholarships

- Merit scholarships offered directly from the college you plan to attend.
- Private and local scholarships

Midwest Student Exchange Program (MSEP)

- Out-of-state colleges in the Midwest that offer tuition discounts to Illinois students

In-State public colleges

- Usually lowest “sticker price”

Community College

- Harper (1-2 years) - \$4,500/year
- Community Colleges with housing
 - WIU/Spoon River
 - Kirkwood (Iowa)

Become a Resident Advisor (RA) after freshman year and get free room & board

Student Loans

- \$5,500 x 4 years = \$220/month for 10 years

Graduate in 4 years!
